


#### **Y4 TRIATHLON** SUCCESS

In Year 6, the children have been learning about the Ancient Maya Civilization. The art topic this half term has been sculpture. The children created examples of Maya inspired glyphs from clay. They were

This year our theme was a little unusual. As you know, we have been working on increasing vocabulary. This is part of our school improvement plan. Books are full of vocabulary. So - this year we asked each child to choose a word that they thought interesting or adventurous or a new word to them. We had a fabulous turn out of costumes all related to vocabulary. The children had clearly been thinking about good words there were some excellent words! Well done to everyone who came to school dressed up. We had lots of wonderful costumes. During the day, the children did various activities based around the words they were dressed up as.









Vocabulary is on the national agenda. Nationally there has been a decline in the language and communication skills of young children starting school. As technology has developed over the years, an increase in screen-time is inevitable. There are many positive ways in which we use screens in our lives, but one of the downsides is the impact that screen use can have on conversation levels outside the school environment. In terms of vocabulary skills, research has shown that there is a correlation between better conversation skills and employability and better-paid iobs. This demonstrates one of the benefits of Improved communication skills. Staff and governors have had some training about a vocabulary rich curriculum and we are trying several initiatives to inspire an increase in conversation, as well as the use of broader vocabulary across the school. In the Early Years we are running a talk boost intervention. In all classrooms we use talk partners so that children get lots of opportunity to discuss ideas. Teachers are planning for specific vocabulary to be taught across the curriculum. We have vocabulary trees in each classroom, where new words are discussed and displayed. We have also introduced "Words of the Week" in assembly each week.


# A Day in Politics
