Items from last meeting		
• Decision that Children will also be coming into school in their PE Kits on the days their class have PE.	Children are coming to school in PE Kits on the days they have PE. Teachers like it. It is more straight forward. Few teething problems in the first week but now settled really well. Will probably keep this system.	
<ul> <li>Class Displays of the HPS project will go up in each classroom</li> </ul>	Displays are up in each room. Pictures of these have been added to the newsletter. We intended to take them down this term but we will leave them for now.	
<ul> <li>Forest School – hopefully starting after half term</li> </ul>	We made the decision not to start this as it would be too complicated having to use parent volunteers. We hope to re-start after Easter but we will have to see where things are at that point.	
<ul> <li>Keep an ongoing review of forms and communication to make things as open and inclusive as possible.</li> </ul>	This is ongoing and something we need to keep an eye on.	

• Four members of staff will renew safeguarding training.	All 4 staff have done the training via Zoom. It was a good course but hard going taking part in two 3 hour Zoom sessions with such intense content. Andrea Needham is going to join the Safeguarding Team. She is often the first port of call for	
	parents and children and is in a position to spot things of concern. She will do the training this term.	
Items on Aut SIP		
• To ensure a smooth transition back to school in September	This went well and overall everyone is happy. A lot of new systems have been put in place.	
<ul> <li>To support pupils to be school ready and to feel part of the HPS community</li> </ul>	A lot of preparatory work was done before we returned. Projects were put in place for the children to do to help with this.	
<ul> <li>To establish active and engaging playtimes in Zones</li> </ul>	We had to do this and it worked fine as we now have lots of space. However, being in zones without the freedom to move around the playground has had a negative impact on behaviour. Some children, particularly boys, like to run. The whole year group being together all the time – in the classroom, in the playground and at lunchtime becomes restrictive. Before the zoning children could mix and interact with others i.e. in the dining hall they could sit where they liked – with siblings or friends from other year groups. The zoning is wearing a little thin for some children. Setting this up and staffing it was fine.	

<ul> <li>To establish a recovery curriculum: Wellbeing Curriculum</li> </ul>	Staff are auditing children as to where they are at. Teachers enjoyed the Inset on this. A Governor asked if this was all on track for the Summer Term 2021. We are moving towards this.	
• To begin to establish the new PHSE curriculum	Governor Learning Walks are on track. These began last term. We can still do them as we use Zoom.	
• To focus on staff wellbeing	We did a lot around this last term: came in late on Inset days, staff gave Ann list of their favourite things and everyone received their favourite chocolate, Ann and Maria are available for staff to share their concerns and worries. Staff were generally upbeat last term. There were some worries but the initial anxieties did go away. We are having our Staff Meetings via Zoom. There are no assemblies. We have an extra staff room with treats occasionally. Staff were very tired at the end of the Autumn Term.	
• Enhance physical health and well-being Build positive relationships with others:	Staff are doing a lot of exercise with the children i.e. Take Ten. This is not a problem.	
• Understand and manage feelings and behavior	Maria talked to the staff about what they had been doing previously – circle time, buckets, values in assemblies etc. Children were not used to routine and sitting in rows. Things were different but necessary.	
	This is linked to above. All has pretty much been achieved.	

	A Governor asked what has been done for the well-being of Ann and Maria. They talk to each other a lot. Ann has a weekly chat with Tim. They have a morning a week to work from home. Ann has support from other Heads. Maria talks to Kathy Puzey which she feels is informal supervision. A Governor felt it is always important to looking after each other and ourselves.	
I. Pupil Premium	Support continued when we came back to school with Richard Gordon and Sally Thomas in class while teachers gave support to Pupil Premium children. We have been given 27 Laptops from the DfE for disadvantaged children. We are in the process of distributing these. They will be on loan and will be signed for. We have invited 5 pupil premium children into school as they have no internet. Three have taken up this offer. The parent of the other two is too worried about COVID and declined the offer. We will be posting work to these children. Extra phone calls were made to children during lockdown to check that they understood the work. A letter has been sent to parents about network providers giving free data. Although it seems to be a bit of a lottery as to who will get this. During the last lockdown food packages and vouchers were provided for Pupil Premium and Free School Meal pupils. Many who receive this do not need it. During the last lockdown 60 food	

parcels were ready for collection and only 20	
were collected. When vouchers were provided	
the percentage that were cashed in was very low.	
An organisation provided Christmas presents for	
disadvantaged and pupil premium children. We	
had 79 Free School Meal pupils. 60 presents were	
collected. Parents seemed to prioritise a	
Christmas present over food.	
We are now providing food packages with 10	
days' worth of lunch ingredients. We asked	
parents to collect these last Friday or this	
Monday. 10 were collected on Friday. Two	
reminder messages were sent. Five or six parents	
rang and said they didn't need it and to give it to	
someone else.	
We have one child still in Spain who is paying to	
send him to a private school there.	
A group of Holly Park parents did some	
fundraising for parents in need, raising £780. Six	
parents benefited from this receiving on-line	
Tesco vouchers. A letter was sent to them	
explaining that the vouchers were from an	
anonymous donor. Only two acknowledged	
receiving the vouchers.	
Free School Meal children received a £60	
allowance from the government for food or	
heating.	
Free School Meal/Pupil Premium children have	
had a lot from the school and government. It has	
been an eye opening time around this.	
A governor asked what the criteria is to receive	
Free School Meals. Parents need to be on certain	
benefits to be entitled. Michelle Hounslow	

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	manages this. She runs a check through the	
	Barnet system. Once a child has been allocated	
	Free School Meals they get this for the next six	
	years even if the entitlement stops (i.e. if a parent	
	returns to work). The entitlement will follow the	
	child to another school if they leave Holly Park or	
	when they go to Secondary School.	
	A governor asked about Looked After Children	
	receiving Pupil Premium. They do get additional	
	money for support in school. This is Pupil	
	Premium Plus and is different from Pupil	
	Premium.	
	A governor felt that the risk is that we are missing	
	children in the system who need support.	
	We are aware of children who do not meet the	
	criteria but we are allowed to put them with the	
	Pupil Premium children who are getting support.	
	Teachers often do this as much as they can.	
	We subscribe to Enabling Enterprise which	
	benefits all children.	
	Each Pupil Premium child has an amount of	
	money allocated but this does not have to be	
	spent on that child. We have a degree of	
	flexibility. Ofsted want to see how the Pupil	
	Premium money has been spent as a whole.	
	A governor asked if it was felt that those parents	
	who did not collect the food parcels do not need	
	help.	
	We think this may be the case. We had a parent	
	who queried what was in the parcel. Said they	
	would have to get on the bus to collect it – it was	
	too much effort to collect it.	
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	A governor asked if the feeling amongst other	
	Heads is that the FSM entitlement is going to the	
	wrong families.	
	The lockdown situation showed things more	
	clearly. Other schools are having the same issues	
	as us. But we have no influence on who receives	
	this support.	
	A governor felt that there are no media articles	
	showing this support in a poor light. Information	
	is not portrayed like this.	
	This is true. However, there are other areas of	
	the country where families are desperate for	
	food/money.	
	A Holly Park parent provided packed lunches and	
	distributed them from her garden. Out of the 60	
	she made only 3 were taken.	
	It is difficult for the government. The system	
	needs a review. It is fraught with problems.	
	Maybe the parents didn't take up this offer	
	because they felt embarrassed.	
	A governor felt that pride is a big thing. Some	
	people are playing the system but others who	
	need support are not getting it. It is a complex	
	issue.	
	A governor asked what happens to the food not	
	collected. Last time the food was given to a food	
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	bank. This time as everything came in as bulk and	
	had to be weighed out by Adam, anything left will be used in the school kitchen.	
	A governor was happy that nothing was wasted.	
	A governor asked about the learning for Pupil	
	Premium children and justifying what is spent.	

Progress has to be monitored closely. Is the gap	
widening? Do we do extra monitoring?	
There is no additional monitoring. The children	
are monitored all the time. Sally will be looking at	
the data around these children and the findings	
will be in the Head Teacher report. There is	
always a gap. This will have widened nationally.	
Potentially other groups will have widened at	
Holly Park too.	
A governor asked if we are monitoring the gap at	
Holly Park. Yes, we are.	
A governor asked if we will have to show how the	
Pupil Premium money has been spent. We don't	
think so. We will spend it in the usual way. It	
covers part of Sally, Maria and Richard's salaries.	
Also Enabling Enterprise – an Enabling Enterprise	
day took place in the Autumn Term. £4000 is	
allocated to books. All these benefit all the	
children.	
A governor asked about Pupil Premium children	
taking books home. This is not allowed as it	
would mean additional people coming onto the	
site. Emily Sampson has sent a link to parents to	
access books on line which is free.	
A governor asked if we could review this. No	
because there is no-one who could take	
responsibility for this.	
A governor asked if the Bug Club used in KS1	
could be offered to children in KS2 who do not	
have books.	
No this is only for children in KS1 and we have no	
money to extend this to KS2. We have looked at	
money to exterio this to KSZ. We have looked at	

	this in the past but it is not something we wanted to do. A governor asked how this works. It is a reading scheme and follows our phonics scheme. The children progress through Bug Club. There are lots of books to read. The children are allocated books each week. We would have to pay for the whole of KS2 to enable us to allocate to just 20 children.	
2. Behaviour - Maria	It has been a busy term. When the children came back they had forgotten all the strategies used at school. They were getting on each other's nerves.There was no group work. The problems are in KS2. Maria has received 150 behaviour alerts. Last Autumn there were 40. They are not major problems. There are lots of low level issues – hurting each other, fighting, incitement, etc. A lot of support has been given to the children. Kathy has spent a lot of time with them. She cannot run her lunch-time club at the moment. We had the Zones of Regulation, Happy Boxes, Buckets. A lot of work was done during Anti Bullying Week. We are trying to encourage the children to think as a group and not as an individual. We buy into HEWS for additional support. We had a Play Therapist. She has now finished but we can't employ another one as we are in lockdown. We have referred children to MASH and the Mental Health team in Barnet. Now children are back at home we hope this does not happen again when they return. Children who do have problems will come back with those	

problems. Whether the behaviour alerts go back	
to a lower number in the Summer Term will	
depend on what happens between now and then.	
This was an appraisal target for all teaching staff.	
This lockdown is different to the last one. There	
seems a sense of less enthusiasm throughout the	
country. Children will be inside more due to the	
weather and shorter daylight hours.	
A governor asked about bad news related to	
COVID and whether PHSE will now deal with	
illness / bereavement.	
We heard of nothing really bad. It was numbers	
rather than people we knew. But, now more	
people we know are suffering – names now not	
numbers. There is potential for more emotional	
support in general.	
A governor felt that children do act strangely to	
bad news and deep down this can feed into	
changed behaviour.	
The change of behaviour comes out later. We	
know the children and can keep an eye on them.	
We are still calling the children/families. We are	
supporting as much as we can.	
Initial signs regarding home learning are more	
positive this time. It seems to be being taken	
more seriously. This may be due to the coverage	
in the media about the children's loss of learning.	
But, will they keep this enthusiasm up?	
Children who are not engaging with home	
learning, not submitting anything even after the	
school has tried to encourage them, will be	

referred to Barnet's Educational Welfare Office	
who will follow this up.	
A governor said that she feels there is a different	
attitude this time from teachers. There are more	
incentives/goals to encourage the children to do	
the work.	
A governor felt that the first time the teachers	
had to learn how to operate the home learning.	
This time they are more prepared and have an	
expectation for the children to hand in their work.	
We now have a policy for this. There are	
expectations for the teachers for each year group.	
Google Classroom has helped the children and	
parents. They like the privacy. Last term we had	
an Inset Day continuing on Home Learning with	
Lewis and Dom providing support. Teachers are	
supporting each other. Children were using this	
system in school and for homework. Parents are	
more familiar with it. There are fewer parents	
querying log-in's etc. We have got off to a better	
start with the Home Learning.	
A governor felt that the Video lessons are very	
helpful – actually being taught.	
A governor felt that it is good to look at this	
positively. Hopefully Home Learning will not be	
happening for too long.	
A governor agreed that the behaviour is worse.	
COVID is more real now. There are more deaths	
and children are reacting to this. There will need	
to be work around behaviour and grief when the	
children return to school, thinking about the 7	
stages of grief. We need to be prepared and not	
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3. Safeguarding - Maria	be afraid of it. We need to keep the dialogue going. One child joined recently with a Child Protection plan. There is a lot of support built in around him. We have 2 children on the Child in Need plan – one is about to come off. One child has a CAF. There is a lot of support for this child. Four have been referred to the MASH team. One referral has resulted in the police being involved. One resulted in a lot of support being given and court action taken. Safeguarding training has taken place and Andrea Needham will be doing this training this term.	
4. Attendance - Ann	We have 7 Looked After Children who Sally is working with. The Autumn Term attendance was good at 97%.	
	This is one of the highest we have had. It did dip in the second week back after summer due to parents being over cautious and lots of testing taking place and also lots of colds. But, despite the virus and other issues this plateaued out. We have had Bubble closures in Year4 and Year 6. Reception attendance is usually the lowest but has been some of the highest this year. We are not monitoring attendance at the moment.	
5. Staff Wellbeing	This has been covered above. All support will continue. There are a few more staff who are worried about coming into school. Within each	

Veen Creans there is flexibility about out a second	
Year Group there is flexibility about who comes	
into school and who works from home. Teachers	
can decide how to manage this.	
In Year 4 one teacher is doing 90% of the home	
learning while the others come in. A teacher is	
off with post COVID symptoms.	
This flexibility helps staff. They can make their	
own choices.	
We will continue with staff meetings. We are	
continuing giving staff the opportunity to bring	
worries and concerns to the forefront.	
We have a staff WHATSAP group to provide a	
little light entertainment.	
A governor asked if the parents know about the	
situation with the teacher.	
No. Ann talked to Nicky and Anna as parents in	
the year group. They both felt that parents did	
not need to know.	
A governor said that the parents feel that	
everything is fine. They wouldn't have known	
unless they were told so it is best not to tell them.	
A governor asked if any other staff have been ill	
recently.	
Some had been ill over the holidays but had now	
recovered. One staff member in nursery has just	
tested positive. A teacher was ill the last week of	
the Autumn Term. We think he did have COVID	
although his test was negative.	
Ann will inform parents via the newsletter that	
Year Groups are operating as that and not as	
individual classes. Other staff may be setting or	
commenting on children's work. She will remind	
parents that roles are being shared.	
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A governor asked if Jenny Elia's children are at school and what impact this will have. They are not at school. If they test positive then their Bubbles may have to close. A governor reminded the meeting that Ann is dealing with this all the time. Health and Safety, liaising with Barnet, etc. There has been an impact on Maria with staff missing and trying to cover them. A governor said we should remember the impact on Maria. This item has been postponed as Diana not at the meeting.	
There has been feedback from one person. A governor asked if Ann would like governors to respond even if they have no feedback to offer. Only respond if there is anything to report.
