Respecting The Right To Learn

The Learning Council have been thinking about the question 'How to we respect the right to learn?' This is linked to Article 28 every child has the right to an education. The children illustrated things they felt were important.





The council walked around the school with the governors and looked at learning in the classrooms. They discussed what they had seen. They concluded that the vast majority of children in the school do respect the right to learn.



The Council also thought about how we can have an influence beyond our school and think about children who are not able to access education. The Council wanted to support the 'Back Pack Project' and support children in Malawi by filling backpacks with items that children in Malawi need to be able to go to school. They wanted to remind Holly Park children why the right to an education is important.



NURSERY DINOS



In the nursery, the children have been learning all about dinosaurs. They found footprints on the nursery floor and one morning an egg appeared! The children had to figure out who had left the egg and guess what might be inside. The children watched Andy's Dinosaur Adventures and learnt where different dinosaurs lived and what they ate. They then reenacted what they have learnt through their imaginary play in small world

scenes. The children looked at different dinosaur books and they loved going on a dinosaur hunt around the classroom.





Year 5 Coding Clubs

This term the Y5 coders have become game makers. They used Microsoft Makecode Arcade application to create a space and dino game. There is an enormous amount of problem solving involved in coding so the girls have been developing strategies such as trial and improvement and using feedback systems to test and evaluate outcomes.

They have been developing sequencing, algorithmic thinking, decomposing and generalising (identifying and using patterns) and conditionals.



Year 1 World Of Work



In November, the children in Pine and Chestnut classes came to school dressed in the clothes that they would need to wear to do their jobs when they are adults. They had lots of discussions about the kinds of jobs that they might do, and even that many jobs for them

haven't been invented yet! There were lots of teachers, police officers, firefighters and doctors with some occupations such as a computer coder, a lawyer, footballers, singers and inventors all represented. This was linked to PSHE work on 'People who help us', as well as thinking about how people get money. It also linked to the Year I history topic of how we change as we grow, and there was lots of speaking and listening too!

Year Three's major topic this term has been the Stone, Bronze and Iron Ages. They have been learning about the animals, tools, homes and art from these periods. skeletons. The children and staff had a great

The classes tasted delicious food from around the world.

This half term Year 4 have been finding out about Ancient Egypt. They had History off the Page coming in for the day and creating a market scene with various market stalls. Each stall had creative artefacts to make from Canopic Jars, Papyrus and making bread. The children dressed up as Ancient Egyptians and really looked the part, looking very regal and authentic. In the afternoon they were involved in Ancient Egyptian theatre and had

Year 6 have really enjoyed their WW2 topic. Linking to their topic on World War 2 (and learning done about The Blitz), they had to design and build a model Anderson Shelter. They had to create a wooden frame, which involved accurate measuring, controlled sawing and the careful use of glue guns. Children worked in groups and the end results were fantastic.





Additionally, they studied 'Light' in science and made their own periscopes. Pupils then had to investigate and identify how and why light was reflected and how that allowed them to see over the top and around objects.
