Y4 Ancient Egyptians



This half term, Year 4 enjoyed a wonderful day out to The British Museum as part of their History topic on Ancient Egypt. They visited many galleries that had exhibits from Ancient Egypt. There were many highlights, but the one the children found most memorable was the magnificent statue of Ramesses II, better known as 'Ramesses the Great'. There were many artefacts, mummies and even a naturally mummified body of a man known as 'Gebelein

Man' whose body had been preserved in the hot sand! Children got to see many paintings depicting everyday life for both rich and poor Egyptians.

They were very lucky to see 'The Hieroglyphs Exhibition' and see the famous 'Rosetta Stone' which was the key to decoding ancient scripts. It was an awe-inspiring day out, that immersed the children in the life and times of this magnificent ancient civilisation

Equality Afternoon



Teachers talked to the children about discrimination, equality and the protected characteristics. Each year group had a particular focus and a picture book based on one of the themes from the protected characteristics. The class read their book and discussed the key concepts within the book. They then did some PHSE or art work based around the book. Samples of the work have been displayed in each classroom. Y6 SCIENCE

This term, Year 6 studied 'Light' as part of their Science learning. They worked in small groups to come up with an enquiry question that they wanted to investigate to help them better understand shadow. Questions included 'Will the strength of the light source effect the size of a shadow?' and 'What effect does the distance a light source is from an object have on a shadow?' They had to make a prediction, plan and carry out their





investigation then analyse their results to draw conclusions. It was an excellent example of children working scientifically; finding answers to questions through enquiry.









Y2 AND THE BIG BAD WOLF

Year Two have been learning all about Wolves. The children learnt facts about wolves in the wild. They then thought about wolves in stories and retold the story of Little Red Riding Hood in a drama session where there children had to perform as *something* in the chosen picture. Some children were trees, some were leaves, a few were even sandwiches in a basket!!

They then wrote some excellent character descriptions about the Big Bad Wolf.
