How to be a Lion - Whole School Book

For the first two weeks back at school, we have been using a whole school book called 'How to be a lion' The book provided lots of opportunities to discuss acceptance, identity and friendship.

This week in assembly each year group presented to the rest of the school about what they had been doing based on the book.

Nursery

After listening to the story, the nursery children did a Talk Time where they spoke about the things they like. Everyone had a different answer and the children all agreed that it was good to be different just like Leonard the lion in the story. The children watched a documentary about lions and pretended to be lions themselves by moving around on four legs and roaring very loudly! They then created their own lions using paint and collage materials. Once their lion was complete each child had to tell their friends and the nursery adults all about their lion. Some children had grumpy lions and some had happy, silly or cheeky lions. One thing was for sure; each lion was different!









Year I

In year one the children thought about how Leonard wanted to be himself and not like all the other lions. The children thought and wrote about what lions are normally like and how Leonard was different. Then they thought about how they are all different and how that is ok. The children wrote about what they were like and what it was like to be a Holly Parker. They had fun painting African savannahs and drawing Leonard the lion with Ed Vere.














Year 2

Year 2 began by discussing what lions are like and wrote descriptive words around a lion picture. After reading the story, they added new words in a different colour, showing how their ideas had changed. Like Leonard the lion, the children wrote their own wishes for Year 2 and followed Ed Vere's drawing instructions to create lion artwork on a savannah background. They also wrote wonderful "recipe poems" called *How to Be a Holly Parker*, which they are excited to enter into a Young Writers competition!










Year 3

Year 3 used different words to describe how they see themselves, how they think that their teachers see them and how they think that their friends see them.







Year 4

In Year 4, they explored how lions behave. They learned that they are fierce, scary, and deadly animals. Then they read the story Leonard the Lion and compared the two. Leonard is timid, friendly, kind, and gentle — he is unique. They thought about what makes them unique and wrote poems about themselves and their special qualities. They were also inspired by the author and illustrator of the story, and they followed their instructions on how to draw a lion.





Year 5

In Year 5, the children wrote and illustrated their own version of 'How To Be A Lion' based on Ed Vere's story. They also learned about lions in science and in PHSE they thought about what makes a good friend.
















Year 6

Year 6 followed Ed Vere's video on how to draw Leonard the Lion and then created their own versions of him. They took the key theme of the book and did a shared-write, writing poems on 'How to be a Year 6 Holly Parker'. Finally, they worked in groups and used an app to create stop motion films of the story.










We all enjoyed hearing about what each year group had done.

Speaking to other parents. A reminder – at the start of the school year and for new parents.

As it is the start of a new school year, I wanted to remind parents about their behaviour on the school site. We politely request that if you have an issue with another child in the school, that you do not speak to another parent about their child. We do have a parent code of conduct that sets out clearly how parents should behave on site. In order to support a peaceful and safe school environment the school cannot tolerate parents, carers and visitors exhibiting the following:

- Being intimidating, undermining, accusatory or disrespectful
- The use of verbal aggression or abusive language towards another adult or child
- Approaching another parent or someone else's child in order to discuss issues or chastise them because of the
 actions of this child towards their own child. Please speak with the class teacher. It is much better for the
 teacher to speak to other parents. We ask you to do this as otherwise it can lead to unnecessary tension,
 worry, anger or upset between parents.

The Code of Conduct is issued to all parents at the start of every school year and is on our school website. The purpose of this Code of Conduct is to provide a reminder to all parents, carers and visitors to our school about the expected conduct. This is so we can continue to flourish, progress and achieve in an atmosphere of mutual understanding. The Code of conduct also states:

We expect parents, carers and visitors to:

- Respect the caring ethos of our school
- Demonstrate that **all** members of the school community should be treated with respect and therefore set a good example in their own speech and behaviour.

Should **any** of the above behaviour occur on school premises the school may feel it is necessary to contact appropriate authorities and **ban the offending adult from entering the school grounds.**

We trust that parents and carers will assist our school with the implementation of this policy and we thank you for your continuing support of the school.

Free Child Car Seat Safety Checks

Barnet Council is offering free child car seat checks to help families ensure their children are travelling safely.

Wednesday 8th October 2025, 10am - 3pm

Tesco car park, Coppetts Centre, North Circular Rd, N12 0SH

A trained expert from Good Egg Safety will be on hand to check seats, fix errors and offer advice – no booking required. Experts will check your car seat even if your child isn't with you — but if they are, they can also make sure they're seated correctly and safely.

Last year, 92% of car seats checked in Barnet had errors, most of them serious enough to put children at risk of injury or death in a collision. Unfortunately, errors on seats are very easily made, but the great news is that they tend to be easy to fix. We encourage all families who use child car seats to attend.

Just One Tree - We are now a Planet Hero School

On Friday 17^{8h} October we will be joining Barnet schools in celebrating and raising money for 'Just One Tree Day' Just £1 plants one tree. The charity help to Combat Climate Change through reforestation. JUST ONE Tree, make it simple to plant trees!
